



Communities & Justice Evidence Portal

- Expected go live end-2021 publically available online.
- Two types of evidence:
 - evidence-based programs & core components and flexible activities.
- Evidence-based program summarises what the program is, outcomes it contributes to, strength of evidence, effectiveness, and how it is implemented.
- What each core component is, how components work together and how they can be used to inform program design.
- Describes flexible activities information for practitioners on how to implement, considerations for specific client groups, who it has been conducted with, and which programs implement it.
- Support sector capability.

Core Components & Flexible Activities

- Core components fixed elements common across evidence-based programs.
- Flexible activities describe how core components can be implemented.
- Allow for local service design tailored to local context, client needs and resources.
- Standardised, yet flexible and supports us to:
 - acknowledge and build on the work currently being done in the sector
 - understand how to adapt and tailor support to local needs
 - understand how multiple services can work together to improve outcomes
 - build the evidence for what components work best for what client groups and in what circumstances
 - evaluate the Targeted Earlier Intervention program and compare similar services.
