Context: International Students in COVID-19

- International students face housing insecurity, wage theft, insecure work and have none of the rights of citizens.
- The industries that shut down were the ones international students worked in.
- The Morrison Government excluded non-citizens from JobKeeper and JobSeeker.
- The public discourse was focussed on the general impacts of COVID-19.


An already vulnerable community, abandoned by the Australian government and thrown into crisis.

Context: Civil Society Research

- Sydney Policy Lab research project funded by the Paul Ramsay Foundation, looking at Civil Society Leadership, Community Connection, Systems and Networks, and Advocacy and Influence.
- 53 semi-structured interviews and 12 in-depth focus groups informing a major report – Nurturing Links Across Civil Society.
- Conducting follow-up interviews, research and journal articles with Professor Kurt Iveson.

Activities:

- Mutual aid amongst students to meet immediate needs led to a 'takeover' of Addison Road Community Organisation.
- A community organizing approach by Sydney Community Forum and the Sydney Alliance supported students to find collective power.
- A coalition coordinated by the Sydney
 Alliance centered the needs of students in systemic advocacy.



Outcomes

- Material support for international students from various state governments around food, housing and income.
- Seed funding from City of Sydney and NSW Government for the Oz International Student Hub (OISH).
- Initial physical premises for OISH from an education provider (OISH now auspiced by Sydney Community Forum).



Takeaways

- 1. Community organizing as a tool to center the voices of *lived experience* within advocacy and service delivery.
- The importance of place and space (both physical and online) for civil society activity.
- 3. The role of intermediaries and community hubs for holding and enabling collective activity.



Challenges

- 1. Ongoing survival and viability of Oz International Student Hub.
- 2. Translating responsive success in crisis to proactive systemic advocacy.
- 3. Increased funding and support for relational and community-oriented practice.
